REQUIRED DOCUMENTS

- Foster School Exchange Information Form
- All college transcripts, translated into English
- Statement of financial responsibility, signed and dated
- Bank letter or statement indicating fund balance; verifying sufficient funds
- Copy of your passport
- TOEFL (IBT): 83 or IELTS: 7 score report (Not required for passport holders of English speaking countries)

STUDY PROGRAM

Incoming exchange students typically take three or four undergraduate (100-400-level) courses in the Foster School with each course carrying four credits. Students from Audencia, PUCC, Peking, and Kobe also register for I BUS 491, the CISB seminar (one credit), for the section corresponding to their native language. Exchange students are responsible for ensuring that the credits they receive will transfer back to their home institution and will fulfill degree requirements. Some courses are more difficult for exchange students to register for because of demand and space constraints, including Finance and Accounting courses and our Management 430 Capstone course.

HOW WE COMPARE TO THE OTHERS

In 2013, BusinessWeek ranked the Foster School of Business Undergraduate Program number 1 in the Northwest of the United States, 21st among public institutions and 48th among all national business schools. In 2014, U.S. News & World Report ranked the Undergraduate Program 12th among public institutions and 22nd among over 400 public and private national business schools. 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LEARNING EXPECTATIONS

Class formats include lecture and discussion, in-class presentations, and case studies. Grading is based on papers, group projects, case studies, and class participation. Exam formats may vary. Typically exams are held during the final week of the quarter.

LANGUAGE REQUIREMENT

Proof of English proficiency is required. This can be demonstrated with a minimum TOEFL Internet score of 83, or IELTS score of 7.

ACADEMIC/EXPERIENCE REQUIRED

Junior (3rd year) or senior (4th year) undergraduate students

FULL-TIME WORKLOAD

Students must attend the UW on a full-time basis. A full-time course load is 12-18 credits per quarter. Stuents are not allowed to take more than 18 credits per quarter. Quarters run for 10 weeks each.

LENGTH OF CLASSES

Upper-division business classes typically run two days per week for two hours per day (including a ten minute break) for a total of four hours of class time each week for a four credit course. A four credit course at the Foster School equates to a total of 40 hours of classtime during a quarter. Courses usually run either Monday and Wednesday, or Tuesday and Thursday. Courses may run anytime from 7:30 a.m. until 9:30 p.m., although the majority of courses are offered between 8:30 a.m. and 5:30 p.m. Courses outside the Foster School may be offered on different schedules.
